
Labyrinth at EFTA (Lyon): What T&P Achieved

At the European Family Therapy Association (EFTA) conference in Lyon, we presented *Labyrinth*—an experiential, ethnographic approach that combines movement, imagery, and shared language to explore wellbeing and identity in human systems.

Through stations including the labyrinth walk, compass reflections, fractal imagery, and the Word Exchange, we invited participants into practices that supported **slowing down, orientation, connection, and reflection**.



The Tree of Words – participants added blossoms and leaves as gifts and reflections.

The presentation drew strong interest from systemic colleagues worldwide, including Colombia, Australia, the United States, and across Europe. For us, EFTA was both an opportunity to share our work and to build new international conversations.

What we achieved

- Shared a practical, creative, evidence-aware approach to supporting regulation, reflection, and connection.
- Demonstrated how systemic practice can use low-cost experiential tools to foster wellbeing.
- Engaged systemic colleagues from across the globe, strengthening international networks.
- Opened dialogue about linguistic justice, whose words and vocabularies are centred in practice.
- Gathered feedback and momentum to shape our upcoming publications.

Why it matters


- Offers accessible practices that reduce stress and foster focus.

- Provides a model of experiential praxis—learning through doing, not only theorising.
